
Why Choose GCSE Religious Studies?



Unit 1 - Religion and Philosophical Themes.

(2 hour written examination that makes up 50% of the qualification)

Part A: examines belief and practice from the two religious perspectives of Hinduism and Christianity. Topics include belief surrounding the **nature of God, religious practice** including places of worship

Part B - examines two philosophical themes from two religious perspectives:

Issues of Life and Death (afterlife, environmental responsibility, euthanasia, evolution, abortion, quality of life, sanctity of life, soul).

Issues of Good and Evil (good vs evil, forgiveness, free will, justice, morality, pacifism, conscience, suffering).

Unit 2 - Religion and Ethical Themes.

(2 hour written examination that makes up 50% of the qualification)

Part A: Sources of authority, belief in an afterlife, religious practice (places of pilgrimage and festivals).

 ${\it Part B: \textbf{Relationships} \ (adultery, divorce, cohabitation, commitment, contraception, gender equality, roles).}$

Human Rights (censorship, discrimination, extremism, human rights, prejudice, poverty, social justice).


Who is suitable for this course?
